In 1953 David landed a job in the mailroom at CBS Broadcasting and retired 35 years later as Senior Vice President of Corporate and Broadcast Affairs.

David first encountered Visiting Nurse Service when his wife Audrey became ill and required their services. In

his words "The nurses came to our home to take care of my late wife during the final weeks of her life. It is hard for me to express my gratitude for the comfort they gave to both of us during those trying days. You have to be there to fully realize the sheer humanity of it... it is a debt I can never repay." VNSHS was honored to have him serve as President of the Board of Directors from 1994-1997.

David has been a Huntington resident for over 60 years, where he continues to live with his wife Betsy. He is the proud father of four children, nine grandchildren and one great grandchild.

grounds of Bethpage State Park and learned to play at the age of 5. When she's not at the Thrift Shop, playing golf or volunteering, Ms. Moffatt spends her free time with her family, which includes two daughters and four grandchildren.



Ralph Lambert

He worked as a laborer, while putting himself through college at Suffolk County Community College and then Hofstra University.

Joan Holcomb - In Memoriam

Joan was a longtime VNSHS board member and served as president from 1982-1984 and a staunch advocate of establishing its hospice program. She had a lifelong commitment to causes benefiting the communities she lived in.

She grew up in New York City and Syracuse, and graduated from Syracuse University in 1952. As a young woman, she was director of public relations for the Community Chest of Rochester and Monroe County, which encompassed most of that area's charitable organizations. Later she headed the fledgling Columbia County Council on the Arts, during an exciting period of growth in its performing arts program.

After the family moved to Long Island in 1977, Joan was not only active on the VNSHS board, but also as a trustee of the Heckscher Museum and a board member of the St. Johnland Nursing Center.

Joan passed away in 2014 and is survived by her husband Charles, of Huntington, three daughters and eight grandchildren.



Jay Walsh - In Memoriam

The Hospice House was a true labor of love for Jay. His first wife Peggy was a VNSHS in-home hospice patient, and not long after her death Jay started volunteering at VNSHS. The dream of an independent Hospice House came from that experience. For years, whenever his wife Pat and he travelled they would find out if there was a hospice facility in the area and go visit. Over these years they gathered a notebook full of suggestions, thoughts and ideas for the ideal Hospice House. When the dream began to take shape at VNSHS board meetings, Jay had recently retired from his law practice. He redirected his focus and volunteered countless hours working through the challenging legal maze required to build the first free-standing Hospice House in New

York State. There were no regulations, codes or policies to follow, but Jay forged his own path, never taking "no" for an answer, and eventually persevered and the dream became a reality.

After his children and grandchildren, the Hospice House was by far Jay's proudest accomplishment. It brought Jay great joy to make hard times in life a little easier for others and surely the Hospice House has done that for thousands of families.


Jay served as VNSHS Board of Trustees President from 2001-2004.



Birjis Akhund, MD - Medical Director

It has been my pleasure, and a transformative educational experience being a member of the VNSHS hospice program. When I joined VNSHS as Medical Director many years ago, it gave me the humbling yet rewarding experience of seeing another side of health care, when mainstream medicine exhausted its meaningful application and patients and families were looking for a refuge of palliative and comfort care. It taught me that care does not end in the corridors of hospitals and doctor's offices. There are times, not recognized often enough, where one must use one's

knowledge to alleviate suffering in all its aspects. I was now allowed to reassure many of my patients that I would continue to care for them and assist in their medical management as needed. I also realized that we physicians had a lot to learn and much to appreciate from the all-encompassing care that the nursing, social, psycho-social and volunteer services provided our patients. During weekly rounds much of the discussion centers on the stories and anecdotes, old and new, that the patients and their families relate to the VNSHS team. This is what epitomizes the objective of palliate programs, alleviate suffering and spend precious time in what we all seek comfort, companionship, and the warmth of a helping hand.

The warmth and caring of every single person who is part of Hospice House has shown me the true meaning of hospice care.




Marge Huber - Volunteer
