dedication of the remarkable 2017 Northport High School graduate and Eagle Scout, Joseph Recchia.

Joseph's scouting career began at the age of 5. A member of Troop 52, he has earned 29 Merit Badges,

all culminating in achieving the high honor of Eagle Scout in May of 2017.

Joseph's Eagle Project was the installation of a 20-foot flagpole at the Hospice House, located at 101 Laurel Road in East Northport. His inspiration for the project came from long-time family friend Bob Cogliati, now President of VNSHS Board of Trustees, who aspired to see this vision come to fruition.

The specific idea to fundraise for the project came to him when he saw a neighbor cutting down trees on his property. Joseph politely asked the gentleman if he would donate some of the wood, deciding he could sell firewood in bundles to raise money for the flag. The fundraiser turned into a huge endeavor in and of itself. The uncut trees were deposited on the Recchia's front lawn where they sat for quite some time. Joseph and his family then cut each and every tree, split them, and ultimately

Welcome Beth Rosenfeld! Director of Performance Improvement and Education

VNSHS welcomes Beth Rosenfeld to her new position as Director of Performance Improvement and Education. Beth, a Setauket resident, is married with three grown children, and joins the team at VNSHS with extensive credentials. Previously, as RN Case Manager with Gurwin Jewish Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, Beth was responsible for clinical oversight and care management of critically ill members enrolled in Aetna's Managed Long Term Care Program, including comprehensive Medicaid work as well. Coordination of care included nursing, home health aides, personal emergency response systems, day care programs, transportation and more. In addition, she worked with hospitals, sub-acute rehabilitation nursing care facilities, respite, certified home health agencies, and hospice to provide care as per members' needs. This position, born out of



a contractual agreement with Aetna, expired after 3 ½ years, and Beth had many opportunities both within and out of Gurwin and Aetna. With all of her options, she chose VNSHS to fulfill her first love and passion in the field of home care.

Beth began her career after graduating college, an RN at Southside Hospital as Staff Nurse. Southside Hospital's Home Health Care Agency was growing, and within a few years Beth took on a new role as Community Health Nurse in the field where she enjoyed working with families and patients, and coordinating staff with a caseload between 25-30 patients. Duties included assessing and managing disease entities, education, coordination of care including all involved disciplines, and supervision of paraprofessional staff in the home until she was promoted in 1988 to Health Nurse Supervisor and was responsible for promoting clinical integrity and quality of care for Long Term Home Health Care Program patients. Beth remained working in this position for Southside Hospital Home Care until 1992 when she was hired at St. Charles Hospital and Rehabilitation Center LTHHCP. As Home Care Administrator/Director of Patient Services, she was responsible for management of their home health care agency including development of and compliance with policies and procedures, compliance with accrediting body standards of care, human resources management, fiscal management performance improvement and marketing. Direct oversight of community health nurse supervisor and 5 full-time community health nurses, as well as dozens of fee-for-service staff. In addition, Beth chaired Long Island-based LTHHCP Directors' Forum St. Charles Hospital department head responsibilities until 2001.

After taking a hiatus to raise and enjoy her children, Beth resumed work in home care. When asked why home care is her passion, Beth explains that she believes in cost-effective alternatives for long-term nursing care, and what better place as we age than to be at home with loved ones around us. Working in home care provides the medical professionalism and care needed in a safe and nourishing environment and equates to an all-encompassing and most effective health care plan for loved ones.

In her spare time, Beth enjoys her waterfront community and relishes time at the beach even in the off-season, where she relaxes, takes in the beauty of the landscape, and finds time for reflection.

Mary Ellen Hornik – The Evolution of a Career

Long-time employee Mary Ellen Hornik retires after a long and multifaceted career at VNS & Hospice of Suffolk. Mary Ellen began her nursing career in 1984 and joined the VNSHS team in 1994 as a field nurse. Working with home health aides, families, and patients in their homes, she nursed them back to health.

She did this for many years until 2002 when she became a Home Health Aide Supervisor and had approximately 30-35 aides in her charge. In this role, she learned a great deal about management, among many other responsibilities. "This was a wonderful time," Mary Ellen recollects. She enjoyed getting to know the aides, making sure they were fulfilling their responsibilities, and also coordinating the aides duties with patients and their specific needs. Other aspects of her job included scheduling and educating the aides, as well as learning the intricacies of Medicare, Medicaid, and insurance coverage within the industry. In doing so, she familiarized herself with the

varied aspects of the field. She also enjoyed traveling to every area the agency serviced and says this position offered her the opportunity to guide people to get the specific help that they needed.

"The greatest part of this job," Mary Ellen says, "was learning from her patients." By tending to their needs, watching them struggle with serious medical conditions without complaint, and living with dignity, Mary Ellen learned about handling adversity with grace from the many wonderful patients with whom she worked. Serving as liaison between aides and patients helped her fine-tune her skills to accurately assess, treat, and oversee the medical care of her patients with acuity, and later led to her next position at VNSNS.

Mary Ellen left the company for a brief period in 2007 but returned in 2008 when a position for Performance Improvement & Education Coordinator became available. Her role in this position was to review an industry standard OASIS Medicare-required assessment questionnaire that is given to patients by clinicians in the field. As Performance Improvement & Education Coordinator, Mary Ellen reviewed clinicians' assessments, making sure that each question was answered internally and accurately. This process can be very complicated and requires critical scrutiny of each case.

In 2013, Mary Ellen became Director of Performance Improvement & Education, where she worked diligently until her recent retirement this past June of 2017. Both of her previous positions, as Home Health Aide Supervisor and Performance Improvement & Education Coordinator, taught her the skills that enabled her to intensely and accurately review data with a well-rounded understanding of the field. Mary Ellen created intricate analysis spreadsheets and presentations of all the assessments to be analyzed and reviewed consistently. In this way the department was able to gauge areas in the field so that the quality of healthcare VNSHS provided not only surpassed standards, but ultimately exceeded expectations for the best possible in the industry.

In looking back, Mary Ellen is amazed at how much she has learned and hopes others have learned with her. She so believes in the mission of VNSHS, in making people's lives better. Mary Ellen says, "it all begins with the fairly basic things: nursing and caring for patients." Her job was to assess the intricacies of that care and in so doing, allowed VNSNS to consistently and critically improve the welfare of their patients.

Mary Ellen has thoroughly enjoyed her many years at VNSHS. Her diligent work proved her to be an essential asset to the organization and she will be greatly missed by all! 🖤
